Therefore, this course starts with conceptual definitions and descriptions, proceeds with 19th and 20th century political and social structure and concludes with an analysis of contemporary Turkey.
The Aim of the Course	The course aims to examine the relationship between society and politics in Turkey, which are in a mutual precession. Through a historical perspective, the interaction between the different political regimes and different social structures from the Ottoman Empire to today will be exposed. Along with basic knowledge of the literature, important topics will also be discussed; such as population, economy, health system, military intervention in politics, women's position
