Finally, the schools of thought of the discipline, main criticisms directed towards them and their answers will be covered in detail
The Aim of the Course	Besides teaching students IR theories and approaches, helping students to require analytical tools and ways of thinking to understand IR are also among the aims of the class. For this purpose the application of IR theories to current world events and issues will also be carried out.
